



*FAIR's Congressional Voting Report is designed to help you understand the positions each U. S. Senator has taken on immigration measures in the First Session of the 110<sup>th</sup> Congress in furtherance of a rational system of immigration laws and policies. We have chosen fifteen immigration-related votes on a diversity of immigration related topics — including amnesty, border enforcement, interior enforcement, guest worker and legal immigration policies — in order to present a broad picture of each Senator's stance. Where a Senator voted with FAIR's position on a motion, amendment or bill, you will see a plus sign (+). Where a Senator voted against FAIR's position, you will see a minus sign (-). Where a Senator did not vote, you will see (NV). During any period that a Senator was not in office, you will see (NP).*

### **S. 1348: Bush-Kennedy Comprehensive Immigration Reform Bill**

*The Bush-Kennedy Comprehensive Bill was brought before the Senate twice in the spring of this year, once as a substitute Comprehensive Immigration Reform amendment to S.1348 and again as an independent bill, S. 1639. The Comprehensive Bill, while nominally increasing border security and other enforcement mechanisms, created a staple of wide-ranging amnesty programs to benefit illegal aliens and massively expanded foreign guest worker programs, endangering jobs in every sector of the American economy. Most of the votes that follow either relate to or are on that legislation and are attempts to redact or expand provisions related to amnesty, guest workers, border security and English as an official language.*

#### **Senate Vote 174, Guest Worker Programs**

May 22, 2007 — Dorgan (D-ND) amendment S.A. 1153 to eliminate a new Y visa guest worker program from the Comprehensive Immigration Reform Package. Under the Y visa provisions in the bill, nearly 400,000 low-skilled non-immigrant workers would have received Y-1 visas each year for two-year periods. Another 100,000 low-skill migrant agricultural workers would have been provided Y-2 visas — a number which would grow to 200,000 with the escalation clause in the legislation. The amendment was rejected, 31-64. **FAIR supported this amendment.**

#### **Senate Vote 177, Interior Enforcement: Sanctuary Cities**

May 24, 2007 — Coleman (R-MN) amendment S.A. 1158 to bar state and local governments from imposing sanctuary policies. Under the amendment no government could prevent an officer from inquiring into the immigration status of an individual if the officer had probable cause to believe that the individual was an illegal alien. The amendment was rejected, 48-49. **FAIR supported this amendment.**

#### **Senate Vote 179, Guest Worker Programs: H-1B fee increase**

May 24, 2007 — Sanders (I-VT) amendment S.A. 1223 to increase fees on H-1B visas and use the money to fund the American Competitiveness Scholarship Program. Under the amendment, a supplemental fee of \$8500 would be charged on a petition for an H-1B visa. That money would go to fund a scholarship to train Americans in science, math and engineering. The amendment was agreed to, 59-35. **FAIR supported the amendment.**

***Senate Vote 180, Amnesty***

May 24, 2007 — Vitter (R-LA) amendment S.A. 1157 to strike the amnesty provisions of the Comprehensive Immigration Reform Bill. The Comprehensive Bill contained multiple amnesty programs — a guest worker amnesty program under which illegal aliens would receive Z visas and a path to citizenship, a special amnesty for agricultural workers and another amnesty for illegal alien children with some college education. The Vitter amendment would have stripped all of these from the legislation. The amendment was rejected, 66-29. **FAIR supported the amendment.**

***Senate Vote 193, Chain Migration/Backlog Reduction***

June 6, 2007 — Menendez (D-NJ) motion to waive point of order blocking consideration of amendment S.A. 1194. The amendment would have increased the total number of family-sponsored immigrant visas from 567,000 to 677,000 and would have expanded the backlog of family preference visas to have been cleared before Z-visa holders could apply for lawful status. Under the Comprehensive Bill, the government was only required to clear the backlog of family preference visas through May 2005. Under the Menendez amendment, the backlog would have been cleared through January 2007, with an increased number of visa applicants seeking family reunification receiving visas each year. The amendment raised the number of family-based immigrants across nearly all categories. A point of order was raised by Senator Kyl (R-AZ) against the amendment on the grounds that there had been no cost analysis of the impact of the amendment pursuant to the Congressional Budget Act. It takes 60 votes to overcome the point of order. The motion to waive the point of order was rejected, 53-44. **FAIR opposed the motion to waive the point of order.**

***Senate Vote 198, English as the National Language***

June 6, 2007 — Inhofe (R-OK) amendment S.A. 1151 to declare English the national language of the United States. The amendment would have declared English the national language. Under the amendment, no individual would have a right to request government forms in any language other than English and the English version of any official document would be the principal document upon which all rights and responsibilities of the parties would hinge. The amendment was agreed to, 64-33. **FAIR supported the amendment.**

***Senate Vote 199, Border and Port Security: U.S. VISIT***

June 6, 2007 — Vitter (R-LA) amendment S.A. 1339 to require the U.S. VISIT system to be completed as part of the enforcement trigger provisions of the Comprehensive Bill. The U.S. VISIT system is an integrated entry and exit system for visitors to the U.S. required as part of the Illegal Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act, the purpose of which is to track who enters the country and when or whether they leave. To date, the exit portion of the program is not in place. The amendment would have required U.S. VISIT to be fully on-line before the amnesty provisions of the Comprehensive Bill could go into effect. The amendment was rejected, 48-49. **FAIR supported the amendment.**

***Senate Vote 201, Guest worker programs***

June 6, 2007 — Dorgan (D-ND) amendment S.A. 1316 to sunset the Y-1 low skilled nonimmigrant worker program after 5 years. The amendment would have ended a guest worker program permitting the entry of

400,000 workers (200,000 after an earlier Bingaman (D-NM) amendment) annually at the end of the 5-year period. The amendment was agreed to, 49-48. **FAIR supported the amendment.**

**Senate Vote 203, Comprehensive immigration reform**

June 7, 2007 — Motion by Reid (D-NV) to invoke cloture on debate on the Kennedy (D-MA) amendment in the form of a substitute S.A. 1150 — the “Grand Bargain” — to S. 1348. Would amend the legislative vehicle of S. 1348 and replace it with the Grand Bargain made by the Bush Administration, Senator Kennedy (D-MA), Senator Graham(R-SC), and others. The motion to invoke cloture was rejected, 33-63. **FAIR opposed the motion to invoke cloture.**

**Senate Vote 206, Comprehensive immigration reform**

June 11, 2007 — Motion by Reid (D-NV) to invoke cloture on debate on the Kennedy (D-MA) amendment in the form of a substitute S.A. 1150 — the “Grand Bargain” — to S. 1348. This was a second attempt to obtain cloture on the amendment to the bill after several days of canvassing by its supporters. The motion to invoke cloture was rejected, 45-50. **FAIR opposed the motion to invoke cloture.**

**S. 1639, Comprehensive Immigration Reform Bill**

*After the first attempt at a comprehensive bill collapsed, its authors and managers made modifications to the legislation to increase support. They also attempted to limit opposition by providing Senators with a series of amendments to the bill which would be provided an immediate up-or-down vote. The effort failed to produce the adequate support, however, and the second attempt at a comprehensive bill collapsed on a motion to invoke cloture on the bill.*

**Senate Vote 235, Comprehensive immigration reform**

June 28, 2007 — Motion by Reid (D-NV) to invoke cloture on S. 1639, the Comprehensive Immigration Reform Bill. The motion to invoke cloture was rejected, 45-53. **FAIR opposed the motion to invoke cloture.**

**H.R. 2638 Department of Homeland Security Appropriations Act**

**Senate Vote 279, Interior enforcement: REAL ID grants**

July 26, 2007 — Motion by Murray (D-WA) to table Alexander (R-TN) amendment S.A. 2405 to make available \$300 million in grants to assist states in complying with the REAL ID Act. The motion to table was agreed to, 50-44. **FAIR opposed the motion to table the amendment.**

**Senate Vote 280, Guest worker programs: H-2B Labor certification standards**

July 26, 2007 — Sanders (I-VT) amendment S.A. 2498 to prevent the Department of Homeland Security from using appropriated funds to weaken certification standards in the H-2B program. In 2005, the Bush Administration proposed regulations that would have made it easier for employers to hire H-2B workers. The amendment undoes these changes. It was agreed to, 51-43. **FAIR supported the amendment.**

## **H.R. 3074 Transportation, Housing and Urban Development Appropriations Act**

### ***Senate Vote 331, Border security: Mexican trucking***

September 11, 2007 — Dorgan (D-ND) amendment S.A. 2797 to cut off funding for the Mexican trucking program. The Bush Administration had recently approved a program for Mexican trucks to transport goods freely through the United States. Two days before the vote, the first Mexican trucks had rolled across the border. The amendment was agreed to, 75-23. **FAIR supported the amendment.**

## **H.R. 3093 Commerce, Justice and Science Appropriations Act**

### ***Senate Vote 370, Interior enforcement: Sanctuary cities***

October 16, 2007 — Motion by Mikulski (D-MD) to table Vitter (R-LA) amendment S.A. 3277 to condition community policing funding provided in the act on compliance with section 642(a) of the Illegal Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act. This would have required states and municipalities seeking federal community policing funds to permit their police departments to obtain information regarding the immigration status of suspects or others. It would not, however, have prevented states and municipalities from enacting policies barring officers from asking a suspect about his immigration status where they had probable cause to believe he was in the country illegally. The motion to table was agreed to, 52-42. **FAIR opposed the motion to table.**

## **S. 2205 The Development, Relief, and Education for Alien Minors (“DREAM”) Act of 2007**

*The DREAM Act offered by Senator Durbin would have provided amnesty to a large number of illegal aliens who entered the country before they turned 16 and who were enrolled in primary or secondary school through college or who had recently obtained at least an associates degree. While the stated motivation behind the legislation may have been thoughtful, in its execution it would have opened the doors wide to fraud and to claims for amnesty by hundreds of thousands, if not millions, of individuals who were hardly blameless in the decision to immigrate to the U.S. illegally.*

### ***Vote 394, Amnesty: The DREAM Act***

October 24, 2007 — Motion by Durbin (D-IL) to invoke cloture on debate on the motion to proceed to a vote on the DREAM Act. The cloture motion was rejected, 52-44. **FAIR opposed the motion to invoke cloture.**
